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UK progress in rolling over EU trade agreements

The table below gives a list of the EU's trade agreements. The EU has trade agreements with around 70 partners. The number of *agreements* is lower as some cover more than one country. The EU's partners in these agreements range from large economies, such as Japan and South Korea, to very small economies such as Dominica and St Vincent & the Grenadines. The trade agreements account for around 14-15% of UK trade in goods.

These EU agreements are expected to no longer apply to the UK at the end of the transition period in the event of a deal or on Brexit day if there is no deal. The Government aims to negotiate new deals with these countries to provide, as far as possible, continuity. If there is an agreement with the EU, the UK will continue to be bound by the obligations of the EU's trade agreements during the transition period. The EU will notify the third countries that the UK is to be treated as if it were a Member State during the transition period for the purposes of these agreements (Article 129 of the draft Withdrawal Agreement). It will be for the third countries to decide whether to do so.

Signed Agreements

The Government has provided an update on signed agreements on <u>gov.uk</u>. Agreements have been signed (or have been agreed in principle) with the countries listed below. In most cases, a Parliamentary report, Explanatory Memorandum and the text of the Agreement have been published. The links below take you to these documents.

- Cariforum (Antiqua and Barbuda, Barbados, Belize, Dominica, Dominican Republic, Grenada, Guyana, Jamaica, St Kitts and Nevis, St Lucia, St Vincent and the Grenadines, Trinidad and Tobago).³ According to the Government, the other members of Cariforum (Bahamas and Suriname) have approved the agreement in principle and are expected to sign shortly.4
- Iceland and Norway
- Andean countries (Colombia, Peru, Ecuador)
- South Korea⁵
- Central America (Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua and Panama)

Agreements which will not be transitioned by exit day

The Government has said that some agreements will not be transitioned by exit day. These include the agreements with Japan and Turkey.⁶

Table of trade agreements

In the main, the table below shows EU agreements with third countries in force or partially in force. The table includes (Deep and Comprehensive) Free Trade Agreements, Association Agreements, Stabilisation Agreements, Customs Unions and Economic Partnership Agreements. ⁷ It does not include Partnership and Co-operation Agreements. Details of the individual EU agreements are on the European Commission website.

The table shows trade agreements only. The total number of EU agreements that the UK will need to replace covers a much wider range of subjects. It has been estimated that there could be more than 750 agreements in total (trade and non-trade).8
